

INCORPORATION OR ANNEXATION

It is the intent of this study to disclose and analyze the effects to the community of El Sobrante under:

- A. Annexation by the cities of Pinole or Richmond.
- B. Incorporation in a No-City-Tax capacity similar to that of Pleasant Hill.

Listed below are previous reports of similar text compiled for or related to El Sobrante by:

- 1. Coro Foundation, 1955.
- 2. Zinder and Associates, 1962.
- El Sobrante Valley Council and the Business and Professional Men's Assoc. 1963.
- 4. William R. Zion, Consultant, Government and Development Analysis 1966.

These reports have been thoroughly reviewed and analyzed in a sincere attempt to avoid the pitfalls which evidently ensnarled them. For this reason no conclusions will be made for the people of El Sobrante, but you are urged to draw your own conclusions and make an active decision.

As a basis for this decision these facts have been compiled. Unless otherwise stated, documented proof of these facts can and will be shown.

Needs and Wants of the community will be analyzed in relation to:

- 1. Planning, for and by the people of El Sobrante.
- Recreational Facilities. Long desired by the residents, and an absolute necessity for the ever increasing number of Youth in our Community.
- Community Redevelopment and Improvement by geniunely concerned and local public bodies.
- 4. Police protection of adequate coverage. A department concerned with the enforcement and protection of our laws and goals.
- A Governmental Unit of local representation. One that will seek out and use ways and means of obtaining the community's wants and needs, and keep local interests their chief concern.

In simplified terms we will analyze what these needs and wants will cost, and which course of action will come closest to accomplishing our goals.

The present study and report is of importance to every resident in our community.

The quality of schools, condition of streets, recreational facilities, police protection, and the physical development of the land are subjects which affect all.

If inadequacy exists in any of the subjects above, and you as a resident desire a change, then you must take action. For this reason we ask the citizens of El Sobrante to join us in this study.

The information and data within this booklet should be considered prerequisite to further study and search for solutions. Work which will be continued only with Citizen and community participation.

In analyzing the previous reports compiled for El Sobrante (listed on page one), it was evident that after presentation of these reports many similarities existed.

They are as follows:

- 1. All were done in a sincere attempt to produce community improvement.
- 2. Minor unintended mistakes were found.

3. Much controversy arose.

4. Each report produced another report.

- The reports were conducted by a relatively intimate circle of the residents or by non-resident groups.
- The true meaning and reasons for the report were lost in an atsmosphere of hostility and confusion.
- The problems of El Sobrante continued to grow due to lack of constructive community action.

It was also evident that many local citizens, and City and County employees, spent many hours away from their regular work gathering information for these reports. They did this in a sincere attempt to inform the residents of El Sobrante. They worked to help the Community towards constructive action and improvement.

These Citizens, the City and County officials and employees were never properly thanked for their efforts. They did not fail in their work. The Community of El Sobrante failed to respond with constructive action.

It would be naive to believe that many of the factors which plagued the other reports will not apply to this effort.

The present "Study Committee" can only hope that recognition of previous destructive events and attitudes will eliminate a reoccurance. For this reason we will; discuss the Needs and Wants 1 thru 5 as shown on page 1 of the report. During the discussion of each item, and at the end of each item under discussion, questions will be asked. These questions will be keyed directly to the problems listed on page 1. In some cases the answers to these questions may be obvious, however, it is extremely inportant to determine your views.

A review list of questions and answers will be available in supplemental form at a later date. The supplement will also include a return post card on which you may express a desire for community discussion or "workshop" meetings and what days would be most convenient for you to attend.

We suggest you read the report with pencil in hand in order to write questions as they arise or to note any inaccuracies you feel may exist.

The Study and Outline for Action can not be completed without your participation.

Do We Need the Needs and Wants No. 1, Planning By and For the People of El Sobrante.

Background: In 1950 approximately 99,545 people lived within the (approx.) 32 Sq. Fle area of the City of Richmond.

Four siles away in an area of (approx.) 32 Sq. Miles, lived 3,200 people. This was the Country. This was all Sobrante.

This is prectically unbelievable, but true!

To more clearly visualize the distance and relative size of these two communities, a commarison of El Sobrante and Selby 1966 might be applicable.

During the post-war period hundreds of Cities throughout the Country felt the pangs of mass population change. Many prosperous Cities became virtually ghost towns. Many community "roots" had been severed and America was a nation on the move. Prior to this period the typical urban expansion moved gradually and steadily outward from a central core. The patterns were logically based on the facts that men gathered together in order to make their livelihood, and due to transportation difficulties they lived close to their work. Because of this work force and its necessity to be near other heavily populated work areas the pattern became an ever expanding circle.

The times have changed.

The people still work in the factories but there is no longer a need to live next door. The factories or industrial plants still need the work force but the age of freeways allows this work force to choose its own community.

The "Old School" must make way for the new.

The fact that we lack industry is a small excuse for allowing disorderly growth.

Do We Need and Want No. 3? Community Redevelopment and Improvement (or Beautification)

The largest populated land area in El Sobrante not cut by annexations lies between DeAnza Whitecliff and Freeway 80. There are 3,951 registered voters in this area. El Sobrante (unincorporated) has a total of 4,895. The State Board of Equalization multiplies the total number (4,895) by 3 to estimate our population at 14,685. This area is serviced by two bus lines. Fart of this area, from the intersection of San Pablo Dam Rd. and Appian Way to Freeway 80, contains an elementary school, a parochial school, seven churches, 60 to 50 business firms, and the only library and Jr. High School in the entire El Sobrante area. The streets to the Businesses, Schools, Churches, and Library are used by residents of RICHOCHD, EL SCHRANTE, and PINCLE.

Have you ever tried to make a left hand turn off Dam Road onto Appian Way between five and six p.m. on a work day? You may not have been able to see Appian Way, but you knew you were in the right (or left) lane because you fell in line back by the Banks! Have you really LOCKED at the deteriorating condition of the streets, at the lots filled with weeds, Depressing? Or are you so used to the "Dirty Faper-Blown Look" on Dam Road that you seldom notice Appian Way?

Are There Additional Traffic Problems?

When the Richmond School System was "unified", a bond issue was passed to build Juan Crespi. Apparently adequacy of access roads was not a factor in site selection. Sasically there are only two streets leading to Juan Crespi with access from Appian Way. They are Manor Road and Allview Avenue. In addition to drainage problems, approx. 96% of this route lacks sidewalks.

Numerous buses weave their way to and from Juan Grespi Jr. High over these narrow pock-marked streets creating dangerous traffic conditions. The buses travel through a residential tract of homes where in many places two cars cannot bypass each other because of other cars parked on both sides of the street. Some of the Jr. High students walk to and from school (bus rides cost from 30 to 50 cents per day per student). At these same times the students in the Elementary School on Manor Road are walking on or along the streets, or in middy ditches when it rains.

A brief outline of bus routes follows showing the number of times these streets are traveled per day.
